


Betel cup

A silver betel cup in the shape of a flower, divided into eight sections. The small object, decorated with embossed floral motifs on the petals, may have been part of betel set (another piece of the set is in the collection under inventory number 658). The pedestal is encircled by the Chinese equivalent of the Greek meander ('wave') motif (leiwen, 'thunder motif'), which suggests that the object was made by Peranakan (assimilated Chinese) silversmiths.

The consumption of betel was a popular custom in South Asian countries. This form of betelware was particularly widespread in Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand, and was an important addition to social gatherings and hospitality, especially at festivals and weddings.

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
